Orientation Program Overview

The summer orientation program at Bentley University is comprised of two sessions. Each orientation session is a three day, two night program where prospective students have an opportunity to get acclimated to campus, connect with fellow peers, and register for academic classes. The prospective students live in the Trees Complex and Slade Residence Hall for the duration of orientation. Each student is assigned to a group of 14-18 other prospective students led by two Orientation Leaders. Throughout orientation, the groups host various meetings to build community, teach the history and traditions of Bentley University, and ease the transition process for the prospective students. During orientation, students have the opportunity to receive their Bentley student identification card, connect with student activities on ways to become involved on campus, interact with a multitude of campus partners and offices during informational sessions, and meet with academic services to gain insight on expected course load. THEMES ADDRESSED IN WRITTEN FEEDBACK

- 121 students reported they wanted to learn more about classes and academics during orientation or would have liked more support
- 70 students reported they would have liked more information on clubs and/or activities during orientation
- 67 respondents reported in the written portion of the feedback that they would like to see more "free time" in order to spend time with students outside of their groups, explore campus, and not feel so rushed
- 65 respondents reported that they would not change anything with the orientation program
- 57 students reported they would have liked more information on campus life and/or life outside of campus
- 43 students reported wanting to know more about athletics
- 33 students reported they would prefer orientation to be shorter and/or condensed
- 25 students reported they would prefer to have less ice breakers after the first day
- 24 students reported other various matters
- 21 students reported they would prefer orientation be later in the summer or in August
- 20 students reported they would have preferred orientation be shorter because there was too much free time
- 20 students reported they would have liked to have been given a tour and explored the layout of campus
- 19 students reported they would have liked more interaction with faculty/professors

•	Overall – written portion of feedback proved to be very positive for the summer orientation program

Author's Recommendations

ACADEMIC SERVICES

Review the partnership with Academic Services during orientation to figure out the best way to provide the support students need. The most common piece of written feedback provided stated that students wanted more information and support on classes they would be taking at Bentley and have more interaction with faculty members. By providing creative ways for Academic Services and Academic Affairs to be involved with the orientation program, students may feel more comfortable and prepared to take classes. Student development theory suggests the importance of faculty-student interaction, especially when that connection is made sooner rather than later.

ATHLETICS

Provide additional opportunities for students to engage in Bentley University Athletics. Many current students and prospective students did not feel a connection or a sense of pride for Bentley Athletics. Determining a way for incoming students to feel a stronger sense of commitment to Athletics and having mutual investment may lead students to have a more positive college experience.

CAMPUS LIFE AND ACTIVITIES

Review methods to improve access and information regarding campus life, student activities, and clubs and organizations to students during their time at orientation. Many students reported wanting an improved Mapping My Involvement program experience, having access to additional resources on how to get involved in different campus activities and organizations, and wanting to gain a better understanding on the layout of campus. The ability for a student to feel comfortable with how to navigate their way around campus coupled with being provided clearer information on how to become involved on campus will lead to a stronger connection to Bentley University and an overall better college experience. Outside of the classroom, the level of involvement will determine the investment and attachment a student has to the institution.

STUDENTS NOT PRESENT AT SUMMER ORIENTATION

Determine how to support the 30% of students who are unable or do not attend one of the two summer orientation sessions offered. The largest missing data point comes from the students and family members who do not attend a summer orientation session. Creating an assessment tool to receive feedback on why students did not attend would be extremely helpful and beneficial to making future adjustments to the program. An additional recommendation is to make orientation attendance mandatory. Research indicates that students who attend an orientation session are better prepared to succeed academically, more likely to become involved on campus, and persist after the first six weeks of the semester.
